

This conference seeks to explore how medieval and early modern British texts deploy descriptions of material objects in order to produce specifically aesthetic and literary responses to problems of historicity and historical knowledge. The literary depiction of archaeological objects frequently questions established historical epistemologies and provides alternative ways of reflecting on historical processes. It is through these specifically fictional, narrative and poetic negotiations of archaeological remains that premodern literary texts may even become capable of moving beyond the traditional master narratives of medieval and early modern historiography.
